Lent - A time of Preparation

In the Eucharistic Prayer, each time we attend Mass, Christ's Last Supper, Passion, Death and Resurrection are made present to us. It is these same events that we grow towards in our Lenten journey each year. It is for these events that we are now preparing anew. The priest who celebrates Mass gives us three simple, yet profound sets of words, to prepare our hearts, minds and spirits for the

journey of salvation which we take with Christ in the Eucharistic Prayer. These are worthy of reflection for our Lenten journey too: "The Lord be with you": All the spiritual disciplines of Lent, fasting, almsgiving and prayer, should chip away at our self-reliance. In so doing they enable more aspects of my life to be bathed in the presence of Christ. May Christ be with us and fill us more deeply this

"Lift up your hearts": An early Christian writer on prayer, St Cyprian, reminds us that, when we pray, God is not listening to our words, but rather to the cry of our hearts. In this, our time of preparing, good words are never enough. Preparing with holy thoughts is never enough. Preparing with pious actions is never enough. The heart, as centre of my power to love, needs to arise and, of all human

faculties, the loving heart needs to be pre-eminent. "Let us give thanks to the Lord, Our God": The self-giving love of Christ, the redeeming power of his passion, death and resurrection, and the freedom from all evil brought about by the salvific victory of the risen Christ, are the central events of love. They shine through and beyond all time and space. In our very desire to continually express our thanks to God for these events, lies the beauty of our recognising the magnitude of the gift and our treasured acceptance of it. GOSPEL COMMENTARY: FR D. O'SHEA: In all 3 liturgical cycles we have the strange story of the Transfiguration on the 2^{nd} Sunday of Lent. In the 2^{nd} reading (Romans 8:31-34) St Paul writes that the Lord "will *transfigure* these wretched bodies of ours into copies of his glorious body". What does "The Transfiguration" mean? Whatever we discover it to mean - is not only about Jesus, but also about us. It needs to make some discernible difference to us today.

There was the everyday Jesus who was well known to his friends; and then there was the moment when they scarcely recognised him, so transformed – transfigured - was he. Divinity shone through him, revealing depths that they had never imagined. Can this happen only to Jesus? When the little girl was asked what a saint was, she replied (thinking of the stained-glass windows in the Church), "A person that the light shines through". Can this be more than an image? Can it also be a reality? Could you and I let the light through? We may be too aware of our wretchedness to feel at ease with thoughts like that. But it is just these "wretched bodies of ours" that are the material of transfiguration, according to St Paul.

In a poem called "The Sunrise Ruby", Jelaluddin Rumi, the Sufi mystic, imagines a girl speaking with her beloved.

'Do you love me or yourself more?

Really, tell the absolute truth'.

He says, 'There's nothing left of me.

I'm like a ruby held up to the sunrise.

Is it still a stone, or a world made of redness?

It has no resistance to sunlight.

There it is: in one way it is a stone, but in another it is a world of redness. This gives some impression of what transfiguration might mean. When you are completely absorbed and self-forgetful as you look at the sea, or the night sky, or a friend, you are still yourself, of course; but you are also more than yourself. At any rate you are a kind of larger self, and not the small self that thinks before he speaks, and counts money, and always looks after his own interests.

Sadly, this aspect of the Christian faith is not as familiar to most of us as it should be. We have learnt to settle for less. Most people believe that the best things are not for them. But we are all called to deep enlightenment and union with God.
