Meet a Missionary: Rebecca Vu

## Reflections on Mission: What exactly is it?

The word Mission has several definitions but one in particular stands out:, "The vocation or calling of a religious organisation, especially a Christian one, to go out into the world and spread its faith." The Church teaches that this is <u>not</u> an optional extra for us as Catholic Christians. It is meant to be part of the fabric of our lives.

This mission or sending out into the world began with the Old Testament. Noah, Abraham, Moses, were each sent by God for a particular vocation: one to save humanity from a flood, one to become the Father of many nations, and one to bring the Children of Israel out of their 450 years of bondage in Egypt. Jesus, sent his disciples out in pairs, firstly, as an introduction to Jesus as he would himself be visiting these towns, but also as part of their ongoing instruction for the time when they would be sent not only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel but out into the then known world. Just like the apostles and other disciples to whom Jesus instructed to go and preach the Good News to all, He gives us the same command, "Go and make disciples of all the nations...".

Everything that Jesus taught his disciples and which in turn has been passed down to us, includes two very important commands, "You shall love your neighbour as yourself " and the one that encapsulates it all "Love one another as I have loved you " The problem is, how do we show that love to everyone, we cannot emotionally love everyone we meet, but this is not about emotions, this is about wanting for others the same things that we want for ourselves, food, clean water, a roof overhead, a bed to sleep in and opportunities for education and employment, everything that the Church calls social justice.

But there is another love, one that goes even deeper. It is the thirst that Jesus had, and still has. It is the thirst for the salvation of souls. At our baptism not only did we die and rise with Christ, but we were given a great privilege. We were given the right to call God "Abba", as we became his adopted sons and daughters. As brothers and sisters of Jesus, we must also share in his longing to bring his love and salvation to those who not only have not yet heard the Good News, or who for whatever reason have turned away from God.

Mission is not just about knocking on doors, giving out leaflets etc. Some will be given that task, but there are other tasks that we might not think about. Perhaps we could offer to meet and greet people as they come for Mass, we might think about becoming a Minister of the Word or an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion, why not join the choir or be involved in arranging or volunteering to help out with refreshments after Mass. You may like to join in the monthly Mission Prayer group, for everything we do needs prayer. The most important thing is that each one of us has a part to play. It's not enough to sit back and let others get on with it, we each have a responsibility to be involved. God has given each of us so much. It's time for us to share his abundant gifts with others.
